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

What is a Continuum of Care (CoC)?

A CoC, as defined by HUD in the CoC Program Interim Rule at 24 CFR Part 578.3, is the group organized to carry out the responsibilities required under the CoC Program for a defined geographic area.

A communitybased planning network for homelessness assistance. The geographic area covered by the community-based planning network.

A program operated by the Dept. of Housing & Urban Dev. (HUD)



End Homelessness

An end to homelessness means that every community will have a systematic response in place that ensures homelessness is prevented whenever possible, or if it can't be prevented, it is a rare, brief, and non-recurring experience.

Specifically, every community will have the capacity to:


- Quickly identify and engage people at risk of and experiencing homelessness.
- Intervene to prevent the loss of housing and divert people from entering the homelessness services system.
- When homelessness does occur, provide immediate access to shelter and crisis services, without barriers to entry, while permanent stable housing and appropriate supports are being secured, and quickly connect people to housing assistance and services—tailored to their unique needs and strengths—to help them achieve and maintain stable housing





"Since homelessness emerged as an issue in the United States, a broad group of dedicated individuals and organizations — from advocacy groups and shelters to local, state, and federal government agencies — have fought to help homeless persons find housing and remain stably housed. Data have become a critical component of these efforts. Documenting the number, characteristics, and needs of homeless persons in American communities, as well as the number of people receiving services and the capacity of these services, is essential to identifying the proper strategies to tackle the problem; it's very difficult to manage what you can't measure."




Unduplicated Number of People by Household Composition The Salvation Army of Denton Denton, TX 2013-2016






Number of People Using The Salvation Army of Denton Household Type: Individual Denton, TX 2013-2016






Number of People Using The Salvation Army of Denton Household Type: Family Denton, TX 2013-2016










